SAVVA Technical Tip 68 – Fire extinguishers

Some years back we mentioned the importance of carrying fire extinguishers in our vehicles. To justify our concern we received the following information from the National Fire Protection Association in the USA, last year:

- * 215500 vehicles were burned out
- * Every 146 seconds a vehicle burns out
- * 310 people were killed in vehicle fires
- * 1590 people were injured
- * \$1.4 Billion damage to vehicles

Fire extinguishers are now readily available from all spares outlets at very good prices – make sure you have one in your collector vehicle at all times and also make sure it's in good order. It pays to buy one with a gauge so you can see the pressure level.

Another warning: We recently heard of a club member in Johannesburg who sadly ended up in intensive care with severe burns when a fire got out of control whilst working on one of his cars. Four cars were also destroyed. It was one of those unforeseeable accidents. In this case a lead light bulb exploded igniting some petrol. He had an extinguisher on hand but the capacity was too small. Make sure you have a large capacity one in your workshop or garage.

I had a similar but not as catastrophic an accident in November. I was running the engine of a recently purchased motorcycle and was unaware the exhaust had a hole in it resulting in the exhaust blowing downwards and igniting some oil soaked cloth on the floor under the engine. In seconds there were flames lapping the fuel tank. Fortunately I was able to extinguish the flames before there was too much damage. We tend to forget we are working with dangerous machinery, inflammable fuels and other combustible materials.

I'm sure most enthusiasts have discarded the old incandescent bulbs in their lead (inspection) lights and replaced them with "energy saving" tubes. They tend to last longer and don't get so hot. If you haven't done so – give it some thought.

SAVVA Technical Tip 69 – Door Handles

So often one sees a beautifully prepared car spoiled by "hanging" door handles. This is especially noticeable on cars that have a chrome strip running along the waistline and the handle should fit in with the sweep of the strip.

The question is why are these handles are hanging down? Simple. Over the years people have been over enthusiastic when opening doors to the point they have bent the square metal shaft that goes from the handle to the lock.

The next question is how do we sort it out? Very simple. Remove the handle, place the square shaft in a vice, heat it up and gently straighten it.

It will make such a difference to the cosmetic looks of the car.

Motion Induced Blindness

In a motor accident, wherein a speeding car hits a slower moving vehicle coming from the side, the speeding car drivers often swear that they just didn't see the vehicle coming from the left or right.

Well, they aren't lying. They really don't see the vehicle coming from the side, in spite of broad daylight. This phenomenon on the car drivers' part is known as "Motion Induced Blindness". It is unbelievable but it is true, and it is definitely frightening. Armed forces pilots are taught about motion induced blindness during training, because it happens faster at high speeds: and to some extent it is applicable to car drivers also, especially the fast ones. So, if you drive a car, please read this carefully.

Once airborne, pilots are taught to alternative their gaze between scanning the horizon and scanning their instrument panel, and never to fix their gaze for more than a couple of seconds on any single object. They are taught to continually keep their heads on a swivel and their eyes always moving. Because, if you fix your gaze on one object long enough while you yourself are in motion, your peripheral vision goes blind. That's why it is called motion induced blindness. For fighter pilots, this is the only way to survive in air; not only during aerial combat, but from peacetime hazards like mid-air collisions as well.

Till about three decades ago, this "heads on swivel and eyes moving" technique was the only way to spot other aircraft in the skies around.

Now-a -days they have on boards radars, but the old techniques still holds good. Let me give you a small demonstration of motion induced blindness. This is the same demonstration that is used for trainee pilots in classrooms before they even go near an aircraft. Just click on the link below. You will see a revolving array of blue crosses on a black background. There is a flashing green dot in the centre and three fixed yellow dots around it. If you fix your gaze on the green dot for more than a few seconds, the yellow dots will disappear at random..., either singly or in pairs, or all three together. In reality, the yellow dots are always there. Just watch the yellow dots for some time to ensure that they don't go anywhere!

(You can alter the background colour or the rpm of the array by clicking the appropriate buttons).

So, if you are driving are a high speed on a highway and if you fix your gaze on the road straight ahead, you will not see a car, a scooter, a buggy, a bicycle, a buffalo or even a human being approaching from the side. Now reverse the picture. If you are crossing a road on foot and you see a speeding car approaching...., there's a 90% chance that the driver isn't seeing you, because his/her peripheral vision may be blind! And you may be in that blind zone.

HOOD ORNAMENTS

Hood ornaments started out with a practical purpose. Originally cars had their radiator caps on the exterior of the bonnet. In addition engines were prone to overheating requiring the need for temperature gauges. These were mounted on the radiator caps. This provided an opportunity for the car manufacturers to place decorative elements onto the caps onto which the motometers were attached.

Over time the temperature gauges moved into the car dashboard and the radiator caps disappeared beneath the bonnet. The ornamental appeal of the badges however held and the creativity of the ornaments took off. Some were particular to the car brands but many were available for individual creativity. Over time the bonnet ornament has taken on the image of ostentation or excess and fallen out of favour. They have in some cases been removed altogether but some have retained the ornament as badges and less obvious decoration. Some makes still maintain their ornaments such as the Mercedes star and the Jaguar's cat.

Classic car owners sometimes just want to make their car special so ornaments are still popular in the classic car movement, even if the modern ones have for the most part abandoned the practice.

I have found some great pictures of truly interesting ornaments and some found on our own members cars.

TOOLS EXPLAINED

<u>WIRE WHEEL:</u> Cleans paint off bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench with the speed of light. Also removes fingerprints and hard-earned calluses from fingers in about the time it takes you to say, 'Oh sh --'

SKIL SAW: A portable cutting tool used to make studs too short.

<u>PLIERS:</u> Used to round off bolt heads. Sometimes used in the creation of blood-blisters.

<u>VICE-GRIPS:</u> Generally used after pliers to completely round off bolt heads. If nothing else is available, they can also be used to transfer intense welding heat to the palm of your hand.

<u>OXYACETYLENE TORCH:</u> Used almost entirely for lighting various flammable objects in your shop. Also handy for igniting the grease inside the wheel hub out of which you want to remove a bearing race..

TABLE SAW: A large stationary power tool commonly used to launch wood projectiles for testing wall integrity.

<u>HYDRAULIC FLOOR JACK:</u> Used for lowering an automobile to the ground after you have installed new brake shoes, trapping the jack handle firmly under the bumper.

TWO-TON ENGINE HOIST: A tool for testing the maximum tensile strength of everything you forgot to disconnect.

<u>PHILLIPS SCREWDRIVER:</u> Normally used to stab the vacuum seals under lids or for opening old-style paper-and-tin oil cans and splashing oil on your shirt; but can also be used, as the name implies, to strip out Phillips screw heads.

STRAIGHT SCREWDRIVER: A tool for opening paint cans. Sometimes used to convert common slotted screws into non-removable screws and butchering your palms.

PRY BAR: A tool used to crumple the metal surrounding that clip or bracket you needed to remove in order to replace a 50 cent part.

HOSE CUTTER: A tool used to make hoses too short.

HAMMER: Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate the most expensive parts adjacent the object we are trying to hit.

<u>UTILITY KNIFE:</u> Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on contents such as seats, vinyl records, liquids in plastic bottles, collector magazines, refund cheques, and rubber or plastic parts. Especially useful for slicing work clothes, but only while in use.

MARQUES THROUGH THE AGES

Brough Superior

Brough Superior is a company best known for it's production of world class motorcycles. They were luxury models that were very expensive. T E Lawrence was known to be an eager customer, owning several of the motorcycles.

What is not so well known is that Brough Superior also made motor cars for a limited period. The production period for the motorcars was from 1935 to 1939. Only 85 were produced.

The cars had a Hudson chassis and had a Hudson engine, but they were distinctive within themselves. Three models were designed but only two were produced.

The first model was a four litre and could reach a top speed of 90 mph. This model was powered by a straight eight engine which stopped becoming available in 1936. Thereafter the engine used was a Hudson straight six which was referred to as a 3.5 litre. The new model came fitted with this engine.

The final model designed was called the XII and utilised a Lincoln-Zepher V12 engine. Only one vehicle was made of this model.

In 1936 Bill Boddy of *Motor Sport* magazine tested an early model. Ironically he assisted a crashed motorcyclist who was impressed by the car, asking Boddy, "What is the nice car you are giving me a lift in." The motorcyclist had crashed his Brough Superior.

The cars were, like the motorcycles, of good workmanship and well received.

Manufacture of the cars stopped due to WWII and never resume.
